Message from Travis

A couple of Judson Council meetings ago, Beth Waterhouse, chair of the Membership, Leadership, Stewardship committee (aka MLS), asked a series of probing questions about church life. What does church membership mean now? How can one be 'in community' when you live in another region or state and cannot or do not attend Sunday worship? How do we take all of the transformations from the pandemic and bring them into our new future?

A little background. The Judson Council is made up of the Judson staff (ex officio members who attend and participate but do not vote), chairs of each committee, plus the Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Church Clerk. We meet for about 90 minutes every month on the third Tuesday. We try to devote a significant portion of our meetings to generative discussions, forward-thinking, innovative time.

Beth's questions are probably the same questions you ask, too (I know I've been asking them). As the discussion continued, I thought of a sermon series after the first of the year on her questions, then Kristine Revak gifted us with one of the greatest sermon series acronyms in the history of sermon series acronyms: BBQ (Beth's Big Questions).

Like any fantastic BBQ, this will require a slow roasting process, indirect (not direct) heat, some experimentation, and tending to the fire accompanied by great friends. We will do likewise on Jan. 10th, 17th, 24th, and 31st. On those Sundays, we will have conversations on these big questions, slow conversations, experimental conversations. Conversations over indirect heat (off to the side) accompanied with great friends (all of you!).

I will present Sunday sermons showing ways forward, and then we will convene over zoom at 11 am for coffee/tea/hot cocoa and conversation on these questions. I do not propose to have the answers, but I can see some new forms already developing if I squint.

This month let us say goodbye to 2020 (all the pain and lament and frustrations along with the joy and moments of grace) and welcome 2021 (it will be another challenging year, but also a year with hopeful possibilities).

MODERATOR'S LETTER

In 2015 I digitally scrapbooked my entire year. As in every day, a layout every week, 52 (times 2) pages of scrapbooking. This largely grew out of the response that I now had three kids, and I didn't remember anything from my youngest's first year. I was asked when I finished the year if I was going to continue. My answer went (sort of) like this, "HA! NO WAY! But I could see myself doing it again in 5 years. Yeah, maybe in 2020". January 1, 2020, landed on a Wednesday and came a lot faster than you would think. It took a couple of weeks to get back into the rhythm of scrapbooking a layout a week, but I did it. I started documenting my year again. Here is what I have learned: Life doesn't get any easier; it just changes. Oh, and 2020 was really, really hard.

How did you survive this pandemic year? I lived in a house for two months with four generations in it, including my parents (which I promise you is something that I never imagined would happen again). I had to become my kids' school teacher, which included becoming a special ed teacher (which I am not very good at). I became your Moderator for better or for worse (remember when you voted yes to me? Back when we were in the same room together?) I've gotten into the habit of staying up way too late because that is the only alone time I get these days. I've started drinking black coffee. I may have started drinking more wine too. I've lost muscle mass and have gained inches. And yet. And yet (and this is the gift of remembering), mostly what I see are the gifts when I look back at this year. It may have been extremely hard to see them in the moment, but there were gifts of rare opportunities, gratefulness, love, and the gift of time. What are you remembering from this year?

For Judson, we have also been given the gift of time. Time to learn new things, to question, to ask, to struggle, and time to live out. Being apart from everyone has been hard for sure. And yet. And yet, we have continued our faith practice. We have lived into the questions, and we have continued our worship in a new way. We have expanded our faith community in new ways. We have continued to meet online as a Council, as committees, as a bible study group, as a racial justice team, or in the case of property, on-site with SunDial Energy installing solar panels living out some of our core values.

Has any of this been ideal? Hardly. But necessary? Yes. Has this year changed us? How could it not have? Are the next six months going to continue to be hard? Guaranteed. In the meantime, continue to be your creative selves. Continue to reach out to each other. Continue to be the hands, the feet, and the heart of our church. Continue to live intentionally, to be open and love greatly. And as Travis always reminds us, let's continue to love this world into a new existence. We are ready for you 2021.

PROPERTY UPDATE

It has been a busy last few weeks concerning property issues at the church, first preparing physically and bureaucratically for, the actual construction of our new solar energy system.

We had been waiting for most of the fall for Xcel Energy to OK an interconnection agreement with the church so we could connect the new solar energy system to our internal electrical system and to their distribution grid. After a fair amount of discussions between Sundial Energy (our solar installer) and Xcel Energy, Xcel gave us the green light, with no restrictions nor additions to our infrastructure, on the day before Thanksgiving.

That opened the floodgates, so to speak, for the rest the items that needed to get done so construction could begin. This included signing a solar project agreement (SPA) with Collective Sun (the 3rd party organization that will allow us to receive a 12% federal tax rebate on our solar energy system), building stairs for the roof door so there would be safe access to the roof, and applying for a PACE loan for the system and getting a down payment to Sundial before construction could begin.

On the right is a photo of the stairs that Bruce built for roof access. You can also see the rerouting of the electrical cables; these are for the downspout heat tapes along the perimeter of the flat roof. That rerouting prevents interference with the new solar array shown below.



As you can see, only the flat roof solar panels (95 of them) have been installed so far. The remaining 45 panels, which are stacked on the elevated roof in the photo, will be installed early

next year. Also, early next year the electrical wiring will be done connecting the inverters (changes the direct current (DC) produced by the panels to alternating current (AC)) to our electrical system and Xcel Energy's distribution system. This will involve both work outside on the roof and inside our building, mainly in the old coal room where our electrical service

panel is located and where the solar metering system will be located. I will let everyone know when construction is completed. I was told that once Sundial is done with their work, it will need to be inspected (electrical) by the city and final approval by Xcel Energy, so we should not expect the system to be operating (generating energy) until after the first of the year.

SHAPAN ORPHANAGE DONATIONS

For others, the economy has caused you to work less or not at all. For those of you with a child or children, you have the herculean job of helping with their on-line learning while you continue to work from home. Your youngster(s) has/have had to adjust to remote learning and fewer connections with their friends.

We recognize these are hard and uncertain times for the staff and the children at the Shapan Orphanage.

They are facing challenges, compounded by the pandemic and military pursuits nearby.

As 2021 nears, please consider sponsoring one child at \$30/month. Feel free to sponsor more than one child (each at \$30/month) if you have the means. Your gift will provide the following for each child you sponsor:

Three nutritious meals every day for a month.

A place to call "home" to make friends, eat, play, learn, sleep and dream.

An education in math, language, geography, history, faith, music, and government.

Love from the Shapan staff and the surrounding community.

A safe haven from the danger of being trafficked, becoming a slave laborer, or a war soldier.

Your financial gift is crucial: the Myanmar government continues to deny aid to Internally Displaced People (IDP) camps in Kachin State. Because the Shapan Orphanage is located near the IDP camps, the Myanmar government will not give funds to the orphanage. You may recall Mrs. Lum, the Director, visited Judson in 2018 to thank us for our financial commitment because the orphanage can only receive funds from private donations. There are no administrative fees, so every penny you give goes directly to the orphanage.

Here's the bottom line: the gift you give will help the children dream about their future in this safe and loving environment. The proof shows in these facts:

three Shapan students graduated from college last year,

nine students graduated from high school, and some are applying to attend college,

three students are finishing their studies in education, which pleases Mrs. Lum (who is 78). She laughs and says:

"I am a very old grandmother. Our college graduates will come back home to teach and take over this work."
