Last month in this space I talked about the transformation of Judson Church, in the eyes of the neighborhood, from the playground with a church to a church with a playground. That was our neighborhood-centric focus. Now let us look at the neighborhood-centric church with a metro wide appeal.

Here is a sample of "metro-wide" phone calls I received over the past few months.

"Pastor, My family and I have moved to the Twin Cities. We are looking for a church that is inclusive, because my child is gay and we want to be sure they will be both welcomed and affirmed, not just tolerated."

"Pastor, I heard your church has solar panels. Can I come to your church and see them?"

"Preacher, are you holding in-person worship services? And if I drive in, will the worship service be worth my while?"

None of these callers called Judson Church because we are located in the Kingfield neighborhood. They called Judson Church because of the church's values and practices. I offer our values and practices are present because of our location. Can you imagine the future of a church in south Minneapolis that did not focus on inclusivity, justice, and creativity? I cannot! We need to lean into our paradox, the more we concentrate on our neighborhood, the more we will acquire a metro-wide appeal.

The writer and teacher Henri JM Nouwen (he said the JM stood for Just Me) used to teach, Anyone trying to live a spiritual life will soon discover that the most personal is the most universal. I think this is true for churches too. The more neighborhood-centric, i.e. personal, we become, the more metro-wide, i.e. universal, we become. Peace, Travis

MODERATOR'S LETTER

Bring your Hopes. Bring your Doubts. Feed your Soul.

It's got a nice ring to it, doesn't it? Does it speak to you? Does it fit with our Judson personality? Will it attract others?

Our Outreach & Engagement Committee (O&E) worked hard to research for and prepare a report on what we can do **now** to ensure that Judson survives and thrives well into the future. O&E came up with a list of seven recommendations, one of which was to develop, adopt and promote Judson's "brand promise." Such a promise must be consistent with who we say we are, be invitational and be backed up by actions inside and outside the walls of Judson.

Your Council reviewed the details in O&E's report, including the "Judson in Six Words or Less" exercise and the SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats) analysis, both involving the entire congregation. The Council discussed input from those sources and we brainstormed new ideas congregation. as well. Then someone said, "What about that thing that's on our website?" Bring your Hopes. Bring your Doubts. Feed your Soul. It sounded pretty good, but we still spent hours debating, refining, discussing, responding. Several said it spoke to them personally (especially the doubts part) and all thought it described quite well our faith community.

But where did it come from? After a little looking, we found an article in the September 2009 Messenger entitled "New Judson Brochure - by Fran Hirsch." The line "Bring your Hopes, Bring your Doubts, Feed your Soul" first appeared in the brochure which was printed for use at the Pride Fest and for use in the brochure boxes outside the church. Fran reported that the development of the line was due to the efforts of a subcommittee of the Congregational Growth Committee. Subcommittee members were Linda Tossey, Laura O'Halloran, Mac Chatfield, Jenny Buck, John Schrom, and Fran Hirsch.

Rather than starting from scratch, Council decided to reaffirm our use of "Bring your Hopes, Bring your Doubts, Feed your Soul" as a compass point for how we describe ourselves to others. To

us, it fits. It feels right. Our job now is to make it come alive, to make it our own as a What is your reaction? Does it feel right to you? What are your ideas for shining Judson's light? For extending Judson's invitation near and far? Let me know!

COVID TASK FORCE UPDATE

COVID GUIDELINES FOR JUDSON WORSHIP and other large gatherings, such as concerts

December 20, 2021

1. As the signs posted on the Judson Church entrances state...

If you have any of these symptoms, go home, stay away from other people, and contact your health care provider: Fever or feeling feverish; Chills; A new cough; Shortness of breath; A new sore throat; New muscle aches; New headache; New loss of smell or taste.

- 2. Masks are required at worship services and other large gatherings at Judson.
- 3. Worship and event leaders (Travis, Carolyn, worship leaders, musicians) will wear masks, but may temporarily remove them when speaking / performing.
- 4. We encourage people to fellowship outside after the service / event.
- 5. The first few pews will remain vacant. The sanctuary remains marked for social distancing, with alternate pews roped off.
- 6. Adjustments so far have worked well, and will continue: using the small individual containers for communion; the practice of shared prayer requests; one offering basket in the back; masks and hand sanitizers available at several spots.
- 7. We are thankful that the vast majority of Judson people have been vaccinated; we continue to strongly encourage getting vaccinations.
- 8. Continue to check Judson emails for ongoing updates and reminders. We will continue to be cautious and flexible at Judson.

Below are additional general points related to use of Judson at other times.

- 1. Wear masks upon entering and exiting the church. Be especially mindful of this when preschool children are present.
- 2. Each small group meeting at church can use its judgment as to whether to continue to wear masks during that meeting.
- 3. We continue to strongly recommend getting vaccinations.

- 3. Winter School: A Series of Documentaries will be shown at Judson, followed by a facilitated discussion.
 - Thursday, January 13th 6:30 PM **Slavery By Another Name** is a 90-minute documentary that challenges one of Americans' most cherished assumptions: the belief that slavery in this country ended with the Emancipation Proclamation.
 - Thursday, February 10th 6:30 PM **Freedom Summer**. In 1964, a new plan was hatched by Bob Moses, a local secretary for the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. For ten weeks, white students from the North would join activists on the ground for a massive effort that would do what had been impossible so far: force the media and the country to take notice of the shocking violence and massive injustice taking place in Mississippi.
 - Thursday, March 10th 6:30 PM **Blood Memory** details the experiences of Sandy White Hawk, a Sicangu Lakota, who was removed from her family and placed with white missionaries more than 400 miles from her reservation when she was 18 months old. Battles over **blood** quantum and 'best interests' resurface in the untold history of America's Indian Adoption Era a time when nearly one-third of children were removed from tribal communities nationwide.
- 4. **Roots of Justice Training**. Fifteen Judsonites are participating in a 3-part program to lead us toward becoming an antiracist community. The first part is an on-line program of readings, lectures and discussions with a Black congregation from Philadelphia to be completed the last weekend in January. The Gordon Smith Judson Fund is underwriting most of the costs. **We strongly encourage youth and young adults** who are interested in this work to join us! SOLAR PERFORMANCE FROM 9/16/21 TO 10/18/21 (32-DAY PERIOD)

Although the Judson solar system has been operating since April, 29th, our November Xcel bill that we received earlier this month and covers the 32-day period from 9/16 to 10/18, is the first opportunity for the property committee to give specific data on how the solar system is performing. This was delayed since Xcel Energy installed the wrong use meter last April when the solar system was started and it was not replaced until late September. Fortunately, we did have a functioning meter for the solar system which has just surpassed 46,500 kWh since last spring's activation.

A quick note on the information below: Judson recovers funds from our solar investment in two ways. First is the amount of electricity we use from the solar system instead of purchasing it from Xcel (measured here in kWh). Second is a "PV" (photovoltaic) credit, shown in dollars, that Xcel pays us for all of the electricity that our solar system produces.

Solar Electricity Generated during period = 5568 kWh

Electricity Used by Judson during period = 4160 kWh

Electricity Used by Judson from Solar during period = 2400 kWh

Solar Electricity put back on grid during period = 3168 kWh

Solar Credit for 32-day period = \$209.78

Xcel Bill (includes Credit) for 32-day period = \$504.00

Xcel Bill from last year's November bill = \$1,126.86

Solar panels

We have finally received bills from Xcel Energy that reflect the energy we have produced. After getting credited, our expenditures for electricity are right where our budget is projected to be. Going forward, we hope to provide monthly comparisons to the previous year's bills. Larry Jacobson, "Property Chair Emeritus," will help in providing those comparisons -- **Thanks Larry!** Be aware: the initial comparisons won't look like much because the short winter days won't allow us to produce nearly as much electricity as we would in the summer.

Playground

Happy as we are that our neighbors and the preschool love the new and improved playground, we are also happy that the new and improved drainage system seems to be operating as planned. Of course, the real test will be the winter snow and the spring thaw. Bruce Simpson, our building consultant/operations manager will add heat tape to the new drain tile to ensure that we won't have the persistent ice problems of years past.

Also, make sure to see the beautiful planter boxes along the arcade entrance that Charles (Chip) tenBensel constructed from durable, rot resistant material. Barb and Tom Balcom paid for replacing the original boxes that were installed to honor the memory of Tom's parents, Curt and Fran Balcom. Rest assured, Barb will have them blooming beautifully next spring! **Thank you Barb, Tom and Chip!**

Garbage/compost

We have been experiencing problems with people illegally dumping their waste into our compost bin in the alley. As a result, we incurred charges of over \$500 for disposing of contaminated organics in addition to compostable material being landfilled or burned instead of disposed of in an environmentally friendly manner. We tried putting a camera in the alley as a deterrent to no avail.

For now, we must resort to locking our bins to prevent any further illegal dumping. This means unlocking the bins before pickup. Steve Hirsch has graciously volunteered to unlock and then relock the bins after pickup. Going forward, we and church tenants will have the added burden of having to unlock the bins in order to dispose of their garbage and compostables. As had been done in the past, we will have a key by the alley door in the Fellowship Hall kitchen. Thanks to all for their help in making sure this new system will work and **thanks especially to Steve Hirsch!**

A NOTE FROM OUTREACH AND ENGAGEMENT

The position of Communications Coordinator at Judson was created out of a recognition that we need help with our collective job of effectively and efficiently spreading the good word about Judson in the Kingfield neighborhood and beyond. Bryant Kumlin has now been in the position for nearly 3 months, and it seems like a good time to follow up with some information to help us know how to best to utilize his skills.

First, some things you need to know:

- Bryant's position is a <u>15-hour work week</u>. There is no "overtime" budgeted for this position.
- He is responsible for strategic assignments (e.g., completing a Judson communication assessment), as well as regular communication tasks (e.g., publishing the Messenger, keeping our social media pages and website up to date and relevant.)

- If you haven't already, introduce yourself to Bryant. He is a personable guy and has an interesting church-related background.
- Bryant works in the office across from Eileen, he is in the office from 11:00AM to 2:00PM Monday through Wednesday, and his email is: bkumlin@judsonchurch.org.

Need a Messenger article/announcement published? Bryant is your Messenger editor/graphic layout <u>support</u>. Compose and submit your article to Bryant with all information included (dates, times, photos if needed, etc.) Your submission must be in Bryant's hands by the 20th of the month <u>prior</u> to Messenger publication (e.g., if you want something in December's Messenger, get it to Bryant by November 20th). Bryant will do a final copy-edit, make the article look "pretty" on the page, and get it published for all to enjoy.

Need help communicating an event? Create an event description with all the details your attendees need to know. Email the description to Bryant at least 2 weeks in advance of the event. He can advise you on the best outlet channels to use. Bryant can then create multiple messages for various outlets. Include pictures if you want them included.

Bryant is quickly becoming acquainted with the Judson community—our people, our philosophies, our ways of communicating, our various committees, and how things get done. He has played a key role in promoting Judson events, including the Remembrance of Souls (21 Judsonites, 15 neighbors in attendance), the launch of Karla Forsyth's book <u>To Be Brave</u> (over 100 in attendance), the Solar panel dedication, Welcome to Pre-school Day (200 parents and kids) just to name a few.
