We had a great time blessing bikes and pets and scooters, listening to The Masked Accordion Band led by Dee Langley, catching up with friends (old and new) and neighbors, and people watching.

What struck me was that many people came to the booth to thank Judson Church for one thing. The one thing that could very well be our biggest asset for the neighborhood: (drumroll) The Playground. We had parents and kids, specifically, come to the booth to thank us for the playground (by the way they all love the new wood chips). Imagine with me transforming Judson Church, in the eyes of the neighborhood, from the playground with a church to a church with a playground.

Now imagine saying to all those parents and guardians and kids and neighbors, "Do you know, This is your church? Weddings, baptisms, funerals, playground, meeting space, sanctuary, someone to talk to, questions about life... We are here for you."

On November 16, 2021 Judson Church will officially turn 112 years old. We will celebrate this occasion on Thanksgiving Sunday, Nov. 21. It is a big deal and a big number. I think the most hopeful and sustainable route for Judson Church is to be a neighborhood-centric congregation with a metro-wide appeal. COVID TASK FORCE UPDATE

COVID GUIDELINES FOR JUDSON WORSHIP and other large gatherings, such as concerts

October 20, 2021

1. As the signs posted on the Judson Church entrances state...

If you have any of these symptoms, go home, stay away from other people, and contact your health care provider: Fever or feeling feverish; Chills; A new cough; Shortness of breath; A new sore throat; New muscle aches; New headache; New loss of smell or taste.

2. Masks are required at worship services and other large gatherings at Judson.

3. Worship and event leaders (Travis, Carolyn, worship leaders, musicians) will wear masks, but may temporarily remove them when speaking / performing.

4. We encourage people to fellowship outside after the service / event.

5. The first few pews will remain vacant. The sanctuary remains marked for social distancing, with alternate pews roped off.

6. Adjustments so far have worked well, and will continue: using the small individual containers for communion; the practice of shared prayer requests; one offering basket in the back; masks and hand sanitizers available at several spots.

7. We are thankful that the vast majority of Judson people have been vaccinated; we continue to strongly encourage getting vaccinations.

8. Continue to check Judson emails for ongoing updates and reminders. We will continue to be cautious and flexible at Judson.

Below are additional general points related to use of Judson at other times.

1. Wear masks upon entering and exiting the church. Be especially mindful of this when preschool children are present.

2. Each small group meeting at church can use its judgment as to whether to continue to wear masks during that meeting.

3. We continue to strongly recommend getting vaccinations.









JUDSON'S 112TH BIRTHDAY

Judson Church started as a small wooden chapel on the urban frontier of south Minneapolis at the corner of 38th and Harriet in 1907. Several years later, the Judson chapel was "bursting at the seams" with new neighborhood residents and a much larger facility was needed. A site was chosen on the corner of 41st and Harriet and a brick, gothic style church was built and opened in the spring of 1915.




Left: The original structure of Judson Church

Covid-19 Update

Governor Walz announced a comprehensive COVID-19 action plan to relieve Minnesota's increasingly crowded hospitals and provide new rapid testing opportunities for Minnesota families. Governor Walz is taking immediate action to free up capacity at Minnesota's long-term care facilities, in order to relieve hospital capacity. <u>Read</u> the plan.

1. As part of their new mission to be a center for racial healing, Penumbra Theater is offering a new series called *Let's Talk* that will provide a space for "compassionate and challenging conversations around issues of social justice, equity and the arts." These bi-monthly and virtual events, facilitated by Penumbra Artistic Director Sarah Bellamy, will cover four topics: Climate Justice, Criminal Justice, Health Equity, and Education. 2. Winter School: 2nd Thursdays of January, February, March 6:30 - 9 PM at Judson:

a. January 13, 2022 "Slavery By Another Name" followed by Q&A. **SLAVERY BY ANOTHER NAME** is a 90-minute PBS documentary that challenges one of Americans' most cherished assumptions: the belief that **slavery** in this country ended with the Emancipation Proclamation.

b. February 10, 2022 PBS Documentary, American Experience: "Freedom Summer" followed by Q&A (6:30-9 PM). The Mississippi Summer Project was a 1964 project that sent 1000 mostly white students to live with Black families throughout Mississippi to register Black voters and conduct Freedom Schools.

c. March 10, 2022. Native American racism. Details pending.

3. Judson's Racial Justice Team has arranged for the Mennonite-based group, Roots of Justice, to conduct Antiracism Analysis Training. The workshop is set for the last weekend in January. Fifteen people from Judson will engage with members of a primarily Black UCC Congregation from Philadelphia (on Zoom) to develop the team to lead Judson toward becoming an antiracist community. Next summer, the team plans to attend an in-person retreat followed by another training session next fall or winter(2023).



JUDSON IN THE NEWS-MINNESOTA INTERFAITH POWER AND LIGHT BLOG:

SOLAR ILLUMINATES CONGREGATION'S VALUES

SEPTEMBER 30, 2021

The pathway to climate action can be like ascending a mountain. Take for instance a solar array. The shiny, electricity-producing array gleams like a snow-capped peak on the horizon. But hiking the twists and turns can be arduous and much farther than you first thought. It takes a congregation really dedicated to its values to remain on the path and reach the top.

<u>Judson Memorial Baptist Church</u> in Minneapolis showed just that commitment through two years of planning through installation. This month, they dedicated their new 56 kw DC system as a beacon to climate justice.

Judson wisely selected three leaders to shepherd the project, empowering them to explore several options and tasking them to report back to other church leaders and the congregation. Bill Forsyth, Larry Jacobsen, and Brad Joern divided the work to fit their strengths. Bill worked on the financing aspect; Larry brought the knowledge of the church building; and Brad handled communicating with the congregation.

They reached out to MNIPL and found a robust solar program with a trusted design-installer and unique financing options. This allowed them to take advantage of tax credits even as a non-profit. Larry gathered the necessary electrical usage data, and within a few weeks, they reviewed their first proposal. It called for a 104 panel-array, which would offset 34% of their electrical usage.

Next steps involved Larry climbing on top of Judson's roofs with structural and electrical engineers while Bill surveyed financing options. Their due diligence found that actually they could build a bigger array—140 panels covering nearly 75% of their usage. This improved the financing and allowed them to bundle a roof replacement with the project. The information changed regularly during discovery, and Brad had his hands full communicating with church leaders.

Finally the day came when the team presented the final proposal to the congregation. Brad admitted he was a little nervous, knowing how complicated the project was. But Judson had grown over the years in its dedication to climate justice. They pray regularly for the earth



and climate change such as climate refugees. Their pastor, the Rev. Travis Norvell, bikes to work and includes environmental justice themes in his sermons (follow him on twitter: <u>@pedalingpastor</u>).

The team had done their homework. The team presented a project that fit their congregation's environmental values while also taking a prudent financial path. After some healthy Q&A's, the congregation embraced the array whole-heartedly, and everyone celebrated. There were still a lot of steps for the team, but Larry championed the project from that point forward, working with the developer through the installation phase.

In early June, Xcel threw the final switch to turn on the system, and with this final step Judson summited the peak. They turned their values into action—a new source of energy that offsets a huge portion of their carbon emissions, helping to alleviate the climate crisis.

We were told to plan for around 15 youth. Kathy had gotten all the ingredients for the breakfast, and we brought them to YouthLink that morning. We served scrambled eggs, turkey bacon, tater tots, bagels and cream cheese, blueberry muffins, and orange juice.


