COVID TASK FORCE UPDATE

COVID GUIDELINES FOR JUDSON WORSHIP and other large gatherings, such as concerts

January 2022

- 1. As the signs posted on the Judson Church entrances state...
 - If you have any of these symptoms, go home, stay away from other people, and contact your health care provider: Fever or feeling feverish; Chills; A new cough; Shortness of breath; A new sore throat; New muscle aches; New headache; New loss of smell or taste.
- 2. Masks are required at worship services and other large gatherings at Judson.
- 3. Worship and event leaders (Travis, Carolyn, worship leaders, musicians) will wear masks, but may temporarily remove them when speaking / performing.
- 4. We encourage people to fellowship outside after the service / event.
- 5. The first few pews will remain vacant. The sanctuary remains marked for social distancing, with alternate pews roped off.
- 6. Adjustments so far have worked well, and will continue: using the small individual containers for communion; the practice of shared prayer requests; one offering basket in the back; masks and hand sanitizers available at several spots.
- 7. We are thankful that the vast majority of Judson people have been vaccinated; we continue to strongly encourage getting vaccinations.
- 8. Continue to check Judson emails for ongoing updates and reminders. We will continue to be cautious and flexible at Judson.

Below are additional general points related to use of Judson at other times.

- 1. Wear masks upon entering and exiting the church. Be especially mindful of this when preschool children are present.
- 2. Each small group meeting at church can use its judgment as to whether to continue to wear masks during that meeting.
- 3. We continue to strongly recommend getting vaccinations.

- Is the signage clear and visible from the street? Is it attractive? What is missing?
- What else could cause people to stop and engage?
- Does the exterior adequately reflect our Judson Invitation of "Bring your hopes. Bring your doubts. Feed your soul."?
- What improvements could be made to the playground?
- What improvements/changes would you recommend?
- Large or small?
- Short-term or long-term?
- Easy or hard?
- How could the wider community be involved?
- In the study?
- In the solutions?

SPIRITUAL FORMATION

How has our church been a spiritual support to its congregation during these last couple of years? Sunday worship, congregational care... We hope you can easily list a variety of ways that Judson has been a resource, comfort, and source of sanity as we live through covid, political craziness, the murder of George Floyd...on top of all the regular stressors of daily life.

How has our church been a support to its youngest members? That question is much harder to answer.

The truth is that it's hard for us adults to even fathom what it's like to be a kid during these times. For example, have you ever wondered what it would be like to be 12 or 13 years old during the pandemic shutdown? Or during the Capitol invasion and as NPR talks about the likelihood of civil war? Or as superstorms become the norm and headlines like "Scientists Predict NYC Will be Under Water Sooner than Previously Thought" are everywhere?

The fact is that perhaps unsurprisingly, there's a widespread mental health crisis occurring among kids and teens. If you're a teacher, social worker, or around kids in any capacity, you know this already because debilitating anxiety and depression among youth is present everywhere. Rates were rapidly escalating even before covid and attributed to the pressures of social media and increasing threats such as school shootings. The pandemic, political climate, and current events add fuel to the fire.

So, how can Judson be a resource, comfort and source of sanity for children and teens? I'm not actually sure. I do know that we're starting to switch the script from "How can we get kids involved in what adults want and need?" to "How can we become what kids want and meet their needs?"





NEWS FROM THE JUDSON RACIAL JUSTICE TEAM

Winter School

The January 18th school focused on the phenomenon of remembering our ancestral culture even when it is not passed down through language but rather through our genes. Also called Blood Memory, this kind of remembering is particularly nurtured and celebrated by Indigenous people. Blood memory is especially important for healing from the genocide caused by Settler Colonization in the Americas. The January 18th Winter School discussion focused on the story of a young girl who found healing in ceremonies that triggered blood

memory of her indigenous heritage.



The February Winter School on February 15, 2022 at 7 pm on Zoom is a discussion based on the PBS documentary, "Slavery By Another Name." The 90-minute video '"resets" our national clock with a singular astonishing fact: Slavery in America didn't end 150 years ago. Based on Douglas A. Blackmon's Pulitzer Prize-winning book, the film illuminates how in the years following the Civil War, insidious new forms of forced labor emerged in the American South, persisting until the onset of World War II.

MY WHITE PRIVILEGE

Judson's Racial Justice Team has recommended excellent books. The two I read most recently were: <u>An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States</u>, by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz; and <u>Caste, The Origins of Our Discontents</u>, by Isabel Wilkerson. These books stimulated me to reflect on my life—from playing "Cowboys and Indians" as a kid to my land and housing advantages. Below is a reflection I wrote last year.

A few months before George Floyd's death, Kathy and I had read Robin DiAngelo's <u>White Fragility</u>. Then we read Ibram X. Kendi's <u>How to be an AntiRacist</u>. We talked about our backgrounds—hers in Hancock, Minnesota and then college in St. Cloud, and mine in Cicero, Westchester, and Hillside, Illinois, and then college in Beloit, Wisconsin.

When I was in 3rd grade, we moved from Cicero to Westchester because my parents were worried that "colored people" would be moving into our neighborhood and property values would go down. I never thought of us as racist, and I had never heard of White Privilege, but we were—racist and privileged. I still am.

In 1967, my dad and mom were driving to the south side of Chicago to pick up my sister. They were hit head-on by a car that had swerved over onto their side of the road. The driver of the other car was a Black man.

My mother was badly hurt. With no seatbelt, she was thrown forward. Her face went through the visor mirror and into the windshield, shattering it. The steering wheel stopped my dad, bruising his chest and stomach but keeping him from the windshield.

The story, as it played out, became a story of tragedy, healing, White privilege, and deadly racism. When the Chicago police—all White—arrived at the accident, they called for ambulances. They had the Black driver taken to the nearest hospital on the south side of Chicago. My dad remembered one of the policemen saying, "That place is a butcher shop. Let's send her to..."—a hospital in a White section of the city.

Mom was in hours-long surgery, as doctors dug pieces of glass out of her face; she needed more than 140 stitches to reattach her lip and close her wounds. She lived.

The driver of the other car waited in the emergency room for over two hours. He finally saw a doctor for just a few minutes—no X-rays or other tests. He was sent home. The driver died during the night from internal injuries.

We were at a court hearing a few weeks later. The driver's widow tried to raise concerns about the (lack of) treatment at the hospital. The White judge ignored her, pounded his gavel, and said, "Accidental death." I knew this was not right.

College brought me more awareness in conversations and incidents, and relationships. I joined a fraternity. Two members of our pledge class were Black: Phil Jones and Mike Young. Our fraternity received mail from around the country after the photo of our pledge class was in the national fraternity magazine: half the mail congratulated us and half condemned us—for "the two Black faces in the group," as one letter-writer put it.

I became close friends, then-roommate, to both Mike and Phil. Mike was from Chicago. When he learned I was from Cicero originally and that my grandparents still lived there, he said, "Cicero! A Black guy like me would never go into Cicero. When Martin Luther King led a march through Cicero, grandmothers on their porches threw rocks at him."

Five of us were at an ice cream shop in Beloit, ordering cones. Three of us got our cones, and then Mike said what he wanted. "I'm not serving you," the owner said. We were speechless. We decided to leave. The three of us who had been served flipped our cones upside down and pressed them onto the counter. That was weak.

At one point, Phil and our (White) friend Bob and I came up with a plan to buy a trailer and live together off-campus to save some housing costs. Phil and I found a trailer we could afford, and Bob and I returned to the owner to make an offer. When we were about to sign, the owner said, "Your other friend—he's an Indian, right? He's not colored, is he?" (Phil was relatively light-complected.) "No, he's Black," I said. The owner abruptly pulled the sales agreement away, saying, "The trailer's not for sale."

In the past year, I have admitted my racism and acknowledged my White privilege, multiplied as a male. I've come to understand that my mother's life was saved because of White privilege. I've come to understand that the other driver's life was snuffed out because of racism. As I reexamine my past, my present, and look to the future, I know that it is not finished for me—I have work to do to become a better human being.

RESTART OF JUDSON CLIMATE JUSTICE GROUP

A small group of Judson folks meet via Zoom at 7 pm on January 25th to restart our climate justice group, which has been inactive since the start of the pandemic. Here are the highlights of that short meeting:

Group decided to be known as the Environmental/Climate Justice Group

The group will meet on the 4th Thursday of each month starting on February 24th at 7 pm via Zoom for now.

Larry Jacobson and another person (yet to be named) will serve as discussion leaders for the group for this coming year.

The group decided it wants to participate in the Minnesota Interfaith Power & Light's (MNIPL) certified climate justice congregation program. Charissa Verdoorn, a representative from MNIPL, will assist our group in the activities and programs that they provide individual congregations. Our group needs to prepare an "action plan" or a set of goals for future programs at our next meeting on February 24th to fulfill the criteria in becoming a climate justice congregation.

We want to extend an open invitation to anyone in the Judson community to join us and/or participate in our meetings.

Finally, we would strongly encourage everyone who is interested in climate change to join in next Monday's (January 31st) Westminster Town Hall Forum. (Click here)

As indicated in the link, the speaker is Katharine Hayhoe who is the Chief Scientist for The Nature Conservancy and author of the new book: Saving Us: A Climate Scientist's Case for Hope and Healing in a Divided World.
