The experiment upended my understanding of pastoral ministry. The experiment showed me another way was possible than the model I was taught.


I am sure you have scratched your head many times. I am also sure no other congregation in America would have tolerated my experiment. And I know no other congregation would have actually encouraged it!

As I continued the experiment I shared my insights and discoveries with colleagues. The more I shared the more I realized no other congregation was approaching church renewal like we were. I thought it would make a good idea for a book. Foolishly, I thought how hard could it be to write a book? I write sermons all the time, isn't a book just a series of sermons? DOH! Nevertheless, I made an outline, wrote an introductory chapter, and sent the proposal to ten publishers. The only one to accept it was Judson Press.

On March 15th the book, *Church on the Move: A Practical Guide to Ministry in the Community* will be released. Judson Church appears on every page in some form or fashion. I think our approach to congregational ministry is unique, exciting, and joyful. I say it in the acknowledgements, but I'll say it here too: thank Judson Memorial Baptist Church!

Some of the ideas presented in the book you know by heart, while others you will hear about in future sermons and presentations. I look forward to continuing to experience congregational renewal and revitalization. Peace

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MODERATOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

I've never been a big fan of the Bible. Why? Too long, too obscure, too many kings and too much killing. It's hard to relate to and claims to be the actual Word of God (their capitals). So isn't it odd that I have six Bibles within arm's reach in my bookcase? Okay, one was Joan's (my mother-in-law) and another is Doug's childhood Bible. I also have my mother's Bible that she received from her parents at age nine in 1940.

I got my first Bible (Red Letter Edition, has a zipper!) at age eight from my then six-year old sister and my second Bible (dramatic illustrations) on my fifteenth birthday from my then nine-year old brother. Pastor Travis gave me my latest addition, <u>The Message</u> (The Bible in Contemporary Language). I will mention that the Bibles are flanked on one side by <u>Miss Manners' Guide to Excruciatingly Correct Behavior</u> by Judith Martin and on the other by Brian Satrom's book of poems, <u>Starting Again</u>. I don't recall intentionally placing either next to the Bibles, but . . .

I admit that I've heard some very thought-provoking and compelling explorations of various stories from the Bible. Many, many of those explorations have been authored by Pastor Travis. Another was decades ago at a party at Mike and Linda's when Ron Cottone had a group of us absolutely spellbound with a story I cannot now remember at all. But the texts of the Bibles just kind of turns me off, even <u>The Message</u>, which is more understandable and even at times amusing.

And then along comes Mary. Mary Magdalene, who I now know as the First Apostle. Not to be confused with Mary, mother of Jesus, or any other of the Marys. Or maybe I should say along came Meggan Watterson, author of the book <u>Mary Magdalene Revealed - The First Apostle, Her Feminist Gospel & the Christianity We Haven't Tried Yet</u>. I fell in love with this book, with Mary Magdalene and even with the Jesus portrayed in the Gospel of Mary. Here is what has been missing in all of those Bibles: the feminist teachings.

Mary's Gospel was there from the beginning, but in 325 A.D. the church fathers created the Nicene Creed at the Council of Nicaea. This Creed of the Christian faith was distinctly masculine so the Gospel of Mary Magdalene, along with the Gospels of Thomas and Philip, <u>The Acts of Paul and Thecla</u> and <u>Perfect Thunder</u>, <u>Perfect Mind</u> had to go. Luckily, renegade monks disobeyed the edict in order to preserve the gospels that related a very different Jesus from the one forming within the church hierarchy. A few pages were lost, but several copies of the Gospel of Mary were recovered from different places. Lucky us!

The Happy Ending (Beginning?): I am ready to dive into these wonderful writings. Maybe now there is a Bible that really speaks to me. I'm very excited!

COVID TASK FORCE UPDATE

COVID GUIDELINES FOR JUDSON WORSHIP and other large gatherings, such as concerts

January 2022

1. As the signs posted on the Judson Church entrances state...

If you have any of these symptoms, go home, stay away from other people, and contact your health care provider: Fever or feeling feverish; Chills; A new cough; Shortness of breath; A new sore throat; New muscle aches; New headache; New loss of smell or taste.

- 2. Masks are required at worship services and other large gatherings at Judson.
- 3. Worship and event leaders (Travis, Carolyn, worship leaders, musicians) will wear masks, but may temporarily remove them when speaking / performing.

4. Adjustments so far have worked well, and will continue: using the small individual containers for communion; the practice of shared prayer requests; one offering basket in the back; masks and hand sanitizers available at several spots.

- 5. We are thankful that the vast majority of Judson people have been vaccinated; we continue to strongly encourage getting vaccinations.
- 6. Continue to check Judson emails for ongoing updates and reminders. We will continue to be cautious and flexible at Judson.

Below are additional general points related to use of Judson at other times.

- 1. Wear masks upon entering and exiting the church. Be especially mindful of this when preschool children are present.
- 2. Each small group meeting at church can use its judgment as to whether to continue to wear masks during that meeting.
- 3. We continue to strongly recommend getting vaccinations.

BOOTLEG COUNCIL REPORT*

Judson Council met on February 1, 2022. Here are some highlights:

- "Soft" re-opening of in-person worship on February 13th. Council voted to approve the plan to resume in-person worship with masks and social distancing. We'll also be recording and live-streaming the service. There will be child care available.
- Check out Cathy Wurzer on MinnPost retweeting Travis's Bike Commute Report mornings!
- Work on committee budgets and the stewardship campaign is starting.
- Spiritual Formation update: we want to show the neighborhood who we are as a spiritual resource and support no matter where people fall on the faith spectrum. We must try to stay nimble with the hope that we will eventually have a committee generating ideas. We should determine what it is that kids really want and need, and not just try to convince them to come to church on Sunday. Carolyn is planning a workshop on being a spiritual presence where parents could come and figure out what they want to share with their kids about spirituality. There are some great ideas for intergenerational opportunities, but a lot depends on the COVID situation.
- We passed a motion that council supports the Environmental/Climate Justice Group in exploring the congregation's becoming a certified climate justice congregation.
- We passed a motion that endorses the Racial Justice Team to move forward with its exploration of what it would mean for Judson to become an anti-racist church.
- Fifteen Judsonites spent 15+ hours last weekend in an anti-racism training facilitated by Roots of Justice. Exhausting and exhilarating! Stay tuned for their reports.

JUDSON WELCOMES AFGHANI FAMILY TO MINNEAPOLIS


Judson's donation drive to raise funds/household goods to provide a start for a refugee family was a great success. All of the items on the International Institute's required and "wish list"



ANTIRACISM TRAINING Submitted by Brad Joern - February 2022

Fifteen members of Judson's Racial Justice Team recently spent over 15 hours (January 27-29, 2022) in antiracism training facilitated by Roots of Justice (ROJ). ROJ is a nonprofit organization that envisions a world where work for justice in love enables all to live authentic and fulfilled lives. Judson participants included Barb Balcom, Beverly Bockus, Keith Ford, Karla Forsyth, Jean Hayes, Pam Joern, Brad Joern, Monica Lewis, Travis Norvell, Leslie Rapp, Scott Simpson, Jim ten Bensel, Kathy Urbaniak, Carley Watts, and Beth Waterhouse.

This training, entitled Antiracism Analysis, was the first of three ROJ training sessions that the Judson team plans to participate in over the course of 2022. This first session included discussions on the topics of oppression, racism and dehumanization (brokenness), racism and identity, and antiracism and collective liberation. The overall focus was on learning what institutional racism is and how it impacts the lives of all of us. We explored the history of racism and resistance, learned a common language for talking with each other about antiracism, and were exposed to a deeper awareness of the effects of systemic racism.

The Judson team is grateful for the Judson Council's decision at its February 1, 2022 meeting to endorse our continuing exploration of what it would mean for Judson to become an antiracist church. Given the constraints of COVID, we plan to use various means to provide information and opportunities for reflection for the Judson community. Our hope is that together we can review and learn from our history as we work through a process of discernment for our way forward.

During the last several years, the Judson Family has enjoyed sustained growth. Despite the pandemic's influence on social gatherings and a world strongly divided about how "things ought to be", Judson's unifying message of family and home is attracting a wide range of personalities. When asked about some of the reasons for joining Judson, many responded with either "the people already there" or "feels like home."

Recently, a member described the Judson family this way: Judson is full of interesting people eager to share their experiences. Judson has bird watchers, quilters, book lovers, authors, movie goers, sailors, travelers, woodworkers, collectors, musicians, composers, writers and poets, artists, hikers, bicyclists, board gamers, athletes, and others with interesting hobbies they love sharing. Judson is a talented, curious, creative and gregarious congregation.

Judson's habit of creating a home-like feeling heavily influenced this 2022 Stewardship Campaign. Reinforcing why Judson feels like Your Second Home Is the goal of this letter.

The Judson Family and some recent events.

So, what are all these talented, curious, creative family members up to these days? Judson conducts weekly spiritual centering exercises which many times guide our efforts out in the world. Recently some Judson family members spent the day at Ft. Snelling Veterans Cemetery putting Christmas wreaths on the veterans' graves, while twenty-one other Judson family members and fifteen friends from the neighborhood turned the Judson Plaza into an Art show in remembrance of deceased relatives and friends.

We met more new friends and neighbors at our annual Pride Festival booth. Over 100 friends and neighbors attended the roll out of Karla McGray's new book "To Be Brave." Karla now joins a growing group of published authors regularly attending Judson. The Judson family/neighborhood Wednesday Morning Breakfast group continues its search for a post Currans location. And during this 2022 budget season we are examining more effective investments in our four foundational faith projects:

Environmental/Climate Justice, LGBTQIA+ Freedom to live, Racial Justice, and Homeless Youth.

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Judson's ongoing involvement with South Minneapolis/Kingfield.

Judson's growing engagement with the neighborhood continues apace.

The reopening of the Judson Preschool, heavily patronized by Kingfield families, used help from the Judson church family; an extensive remodel of the Judson playground is much appreciated by the neighborhood kids; a resettlement program for an Afghan family including furniture and clothing was conducted; the highly regarded Judson Meals on Wheels Kitchen remained open and staffed through the recent covid tribulations; and we've begun studying how to make the 41st street/Harriet Ave corner more inviting to the neighborhood. Recently, several Senior Citizen Judson members prepared "we're thinking of you" care packages for twenty-nine school kids (elementary to college) whose lives are being discombobulated by all the covid restrictions.

Post Covid possibilities

Anticipating Covid's end, we are brainstorming how to leverage our internal investments into creating a better world. Ideas in search of a champion include:

- Using our Racial Justice training to better identify and root-out systemic racism;
- Renewing our involvement with the Open Streets event while pondering more Kingfield events like the Rummage sale and the Backyard Music Festival;
- Investigating whether our solar investment might be an energy source for others;
- Exploring how to make the building more accessible to:
 - \Rightarrow private meditations. A 1950's policy whose time may have returned;
 - \Rightarrow more neighborhood groups already working on solving local problems;
- Handling some of life's blows. While professional help may be the first choice, sometimes you just need a discussion group with folks "who have been there."

Spiritual Formation by Carolyn Kolovitz

Albert Einstein wrote "The most beautiful thing we can experience is the mysterious."

The stories of Lent invite us into Mystery, and my guided reflections during the Sunday services this month will offer us the time and space to explore the biggest mysteries of all:

Why are we born into these human bodies? What happens when we die? What does it all mean?

I don't have the answers to these questions, but I can facilitate us each tapping into our own ways of knowing, our own lived experiences - as a way of growing in peace with Mystery, as a way of being more comfortable talking with each other about our own varied beliefs and explorations.

One source I'll be using to explore these questions is the ancient Christian writings of the Gospel of Mary Magdalene. If you're unfamiliar with this gospel, there are several good books about it and its spiritual lessons. Our Women's Circle is currently reading Mary Magdalene Revealed: The First Apostle, Her Feminist Gospel, And the Christianity We Haven't Tried Yet by Meggan Watterson. A heavier, more theological book is The Meaning of Mary Magdalene: Discovering the Woman at the Heart of Christianity by Episcopal priest Cynthia Bourgeault. Both of these books offer a fresh, and for some – powerful, take on the true meaning of Easter. If you read either of these books and want to talk about them, let me know - maybe we can start a second group!

Also, watch your email for details about an online meditation gathering to celebrate the Spring Equinox on March 20. While life is filled with mysteries and unanswerable questions, one thing we know for sure is that spring follows winter. We're also thinking about hosting another Taize meditation this month. These types of gatherings are initiated by members of the congregation – and I'm happy to help make them happen, so if you have ideas of your own – please let me know!

- Group decided to be known as the Environmental/Climate Justice Team

- Our team will be preparing an "action plan" or a set of goals for future activities/programs to fulfill the criteria of the MNIPL CJC program.
- Besides the MNIPL CJC program, our team is also interested in doing environmental and climate change activities or projects for and with the Judson community.
- We will plan to have an activity/program to celebrate Earth Day (April 22nd). Possibly holding an event at Judson on the following Sunday, April 24th.
- We want to extend an open invitation to anyone in the Judson community to join us in our programs and/or participate in our meetings.

EXPLORING ANTIRACISM Submitted by Jean Hayes

Last month, the Judson Council passed a resolution to explore what it would mean for Judson to work toward becoming an antiracism community. The resolution is consistent with action the church took a few years ago. During a retreat which followed the all-church trip to Memphis, four interrelated social action groups were created. As a relatively recent participant with the Racial Justice Team (one of the 4 groups), I would like to share my thoughts about antiracism, which have evolved over my two years with the team. I:

- Came to understand that words like "racist" and "antiracism" often trigger unhelpful emotional reactions. Those words (and others) need to be studied, analyzed and discussed together with the whole community before meaningful action can happen.
- Learned that the foundation of our country was built with governmental and social systems that maintain White supremacy through economic and political power.
- Became aware of how the White church was instrumental in creating and maintaining systems of White supremacy which continue today.
- Learned that individual "racists" are not needed to perpetuate White supremacy in any given system. I have been shown how governmental and social systems continue to have unequal outcomes even without the actions of "racist people."
- Learned that we have to analyze how inequity is happening in order to facilitate change.
- Was reminded that God does not require us to be successful; only to be faithful to the journey.

I believe that Judsonites are open-minded, inclusive people and not 'racist,' but I think we may not be fully aware of where and how racial inequity is perpetuated. I think we might not know how to discover and analyze it. I think we may not fully understand what antiracism action looks like.

I think that discovery and analysis of racism and antiracism and how to take action, start with talking about it throughout the congregation and with our friends and loved ones. I think we need to look for opportunities for discussion at Judson. I would like us to visit informally over coffee during "Ponderings from the Pews," or invite committees or committee representatives to meet together occasionally, or participate in more educational events on more topics. How and where could you share your thoughts and feelings? What learning opportunities would resonate with you? Please let us know. WINTER SCHOOL

The February Winter School focused on the PBS documentary, "Slavery By Another Name." The film illuminates how slavery did not end with the Civil War. Rather, new forms of forced labor emerged through Convict Leasing, sharecropping and peonage. Also discussed was related information from Michelle Alexander's book, <u>The New Jim Crow</u> and the recent Penumbra program, "Let's Talk" about the Criminal Justice System. Feedback from participants of the February Winter School include:

- "I had no idea what the chain gangs were about."
- "I did not know the word, "peonage."
- "I did not understand the extent to which prison labor provided and continues to provide financial benefits to private industry."
- "It was shocking to learn the degree of human ruination that is caused by criminalization of common life conditions.

The March Winter School is March 15, 2022 at 7:00 PM on Zoom. The discussion will be based on the PBS film, "Freedom Summer."

For ten weeks in 1964, White students from the North joined activists in Mississippi, forcing the media and the country to notice the violence and injustice. The students lived with local Black families, registered people to vote, held Freedom Schools, and demonstrated. Some were killed. Many prepared wills and final letters to their families before they left home. The Voting Rights Act of 1965 was one of the outcomes of Freedom Summer. The discussion March 15th will include a brief overview of recent voting rights legislation backlash. Please view the film before the discussion if possible.

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Listed below is the Judson solar system performance from our February Xcel bill that covers the 32-day period from 12/19/21 to 1/20/22.

I suspect that our "monthly" solar generated energy amount has "bottomed out" with only about 1,250 kWh of electricity having been produced during the 32 period around the holidays. In comparison, the 30 days of June last year produced slightly over 9,000 kWh of electricity.

Also, when checking the solar app this winter it looks like we have frequently been in the situation similar to what is shown by the enclosed photo taken on Sunday, Feb 13th. Because of the frequent snowfalls we've been getting this winter, the 95 panels on the flat roof have been covered with snow while the snow slides off of the 45 panels on the steeper sloped roof. So most of electricity we have been generating this winter is from the 45 panels on the sloped roof while very little has been coming from the snow-covered panels on the flat roof.



Finally, although it says we used 0 electricity from our solar system, we simply did not produce enough energy for it to show up on Xcel's meters! At least that is the explanation I got when I called an Xcel representative this week. It will show up in next month's bill.

Electricity Used by Judson during period = 18,880 kWh

Electricity Used by Judson from Solar during period = 0 kWh

Solar Electricity put back on grid during period = 1,253 kWh
